## **The Declaration of Independence**A Found Poem Activity

#### **Objective:**

In this activity you will gain a deeper insight into the meaning of the Declaration of Independence by carefully selecting and organizing words and phrases from the original text to create a found poem. A found poem is a type of poem that is entirely made out of someone else's words. Just as a collage is art made of someone else's images, but cut up and arranged by the artist, so a "found poem" is a poem made of words and phrases found in another text.

#### **Procedure:**

- 1. Carefully read the provided excerpt from the Declaration of Independence.
- 2. Highlight or underline 20-25 words and phrases that seem particularly interesting or important.
- 3. Copy each word and phrase onto the accompanying worksheet in the same order as they appeared in the original text.
- 4. Read over your list of words or phrases. Eliminate any words or phrases that seem unnecessary. Your goal is to cut your list down to 10-15 words and phrases. The resulting arrangement of these words and phrases is your "found poem."
- 5. You may now add up to 5 of your own words to help create flow.
- 6. Read your poem looking for one word or phrase that seems to sum up the message or theme of your poem. Use this word or phrase as the title of your found poem.
- 7. Type your completed found poem for homework.

("Statement of Beliefs" excerpted from the <u>Declaration of Independence</u> – 1776.)

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness. That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed. That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that Governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and accordingly all experience hath shewn, that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of

abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same Object evinces a design to reduce them under absolute Despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such Government, and to provide new Guards for their future security. Such has been the patient sufferance of these Colonies; and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former Systems of Government. The history of the present King of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute Tyranny over these States.
